

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A Lenten Reflection: What does It mean to be a Good Neighbor?

Jesus said, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind." This is the greatest and first commandment. And a second is like it: "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." (Matthew 22:37-39 NRSV)

"It's a Beautiful Day in the Neighborhood" was the opening line of the theme song sung by ordained Presbyterian minister, Mr. Fred Rogers as he invited all the viewers into his home and hospitality each week-day afternoon. His gentle demeanor made children feel safe. He transported children via trolley to the Land of Make Believe to help young ones from tots to teens cope with unsettling and difficult topics through puppet characters like Daniel Striped Tiger, Lady Elaine Fairchild, King Friday XIII, Queen Sarah, Henrietta Pussycat, X the Owl, and Grandpere. There were also the neighbors who dropped by including Mailman Mr. McFeeley, Neighbor Aber, and Handyman Joe Negri. Currently, on PBS, Daniel Tiger, the son of Daniel Striped Tiger, and his friends continue the legacy of Mr. Rogers Neighborhood.

Did you know that Mr. Rogers Day is Wednesday, March 20 (his birthdate) on the Presbyterian Church calendar? When I read the date commemorating his ministry on the calendar, a rush of childhood memories flooded over me and got me thinking about being a good neighbor. Am I a good enough neighbor and what I might do better?



The first scripture that pops from my childhood memory is the "Golden Rule" where Jesus says, "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you." (Luke

6:31 NRSV) Matthew 7:12 expands the rule to include "**In everything** do to others as you would have them do to you; for this is the law and the prophets." I think we need rules and laws to understand the boundaries of conduct in relationships. The Golden Rule is the rule I follow for conducting relationships with others as I continue to grow more in *Christlikeness*. But then I thought there's more.

I'm then reminded of the attributes of Christlikeness, the fruit of the Spirit which is where my internal compass is situated. From my internal compass, everything I do flows from it. In Paul's letter to the church in Galatia, he writes," By contrast, the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. There is no law against such things. (Galatians 5:22-23 NRSV) The condition of my heart matters because agape love or perfect Christlike love, makes the law and commandments secondary or less needed guidelines because I know what the right thing is to do.

The message is simple but clear. I know what is right and there is power in knowing I know what is right and how I should conduct myself. To help me keep Christ's love inside of me fresh and vital, I belong to a community with you, the family of Christ's Community Church. I know we are good neighbors. We have been and are good neighbors in many ways. We donate food to the food cupboard, make meals for the Life Center, fund many missions at home and across the globe, host various groups including NA, Al Anon, and the Cub Scouts plus we have the dance group. We have welcomed into our home and fostered the lives of young people. We have been there for each other in times of sickness and sorrow, and in joy and commencement. We are good neighbors. Can we be more neighborly? And what would that look like because "everyone" is our neighbor near and far.

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The Liberian Mission: A Slow and Steady Sure Success

(Report from Elder Eric Myers)

As one of the missions supported by the Christ's Community Church, The Liberian Mission was started in 2017 when the church responded to the call of God to provide a spirit-led support to the Zahn people in of Nimba County in Liberia, West Africa, through a rural community organizing and economic empowerment work in the Zahn Chiefdom in Liberia.

Slowly, this vision and effort is helping to organize a rural community, alleviate poverty and create a voice for the people of the Zahn community.

Through this initiative and support, a rural community organizing effort has created a community organization (the Zahnloleawon Community Development Organization-ZALCDO) which is slowly serving as a catalyst for various self-help initiatives in the Zahn Chiefdom.

Slowly, the Zahn community is acclimating to working together through a single community structure (ZALCDO), outside of government and political control. This is significant because rural communities in Liberia historically rely on government for all of their development needs, a government that hardly shows up when expected.

Since its organization and registration with the government of Liberia in 2018, ZALCDO has organized farmers in Zahn into 13 farming cooperatives. In 2020 during the height of the COVID-19 pandemic, food produced by these Co-ops became a lifesaver when most parts of the country faced food shortages due to the suspension of travels in parts of the country.



Slowly for the first time in Zahn, there is an economic self-help organization in the Chiefdom, helping small farmer groups in all of the 13 towns in the Chiefdom to practice farming as a business in order to generate in-

come for their members, lend some of their group savings to provide small loans to community members, and generate interest incomes for their groups.

Slowly, this spirit-led support by the church is also raising unexpected leaders in the Zahn community. Since its inception, the Liberian Mission's most difficult challenge has been its poor leadership capability. Since its creation, ZALCDO has not had the leadership it needs to develop, implement and monitor its programs, and this has led to the poor performance of the mission. However, and surprisingly, six (6) of the nearly 35 Co-op groups created by ZALCDO have proven to be unrelenting and are determined to lead the pack. These groups have found a way and the ability to lead themselves and create and implement their own programs. As a result, these groups are becoming the future of the Liberian Mission.

After what appeared to be not only a lack of leadership but a loss of a clear direction, the mission is naturally and slowly reinventing and reforming itself, charting its own course, setting its own direction, and determining its own future and destiny. It's a slow and steady success.
