Every week, Emmanual Saylee gathers the children around him during worship, saying, "This is our hope," and the congregation responds, "To know Christ and to make Him Known." And I believe you, because of the way you live together.

Paul writes to the Philippians, "...I consider everything a loss compared to the surpassing greatness of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord, for whose sake I have lost all things. I consider them rubbish, that I may gain Christ and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but that which is through faith in Christ..." (Philippians 3:8, 9b)

Though we are destined to worship God in spirit and truth (*John 4:24*), God did not jump to creating us purely as spirits. God created us body, soul, spirit and mind in a material universe. Somehow, the numbered days of our life on earth are each an opportunity to learn to love God with our body, soul, spirit and mind. (*Psalm 90:12*) And it is our hope, not something we see.

April 16 marks four years since the death of my brother-in-law at Delaware County Memorial Hospital. A few months more and doctors would have known better how to treat the corona virus. He lay many days in the ventilator with family kept away. He was essential to his wife, children and grandchildren, co-workers; essential, in a way you cannot put into words, to my husband and son. The loss deepens with time.


We all lost essential people. The congregation couldn't even gather in person to hold each other. The leaders scrambled to open up the doors of the church on-line. How comforting it was to see the faces of those we loved on the screen! When the congregation came back in person, though, many people were gone.

Even now, essential losses continue among us. Christ is our greatest Good, but not without sorrows (*Isaiah 53:3*) and not because we don't care about life and people. "...Jesus knew that the time had come for him to leave this world and go to the Father, Having loved his own who were in the world, he now showed them the full extent of his love." (John 13:1b)

On screen, we are pure spirit avatars, but we have bodies and physical locations where we struggle to worship God with mind, body, spirit and soul. Even the Scripture writers express the uncertainty of life in the world that God created. *"For who knows what is good for a man in life, during the few and meaningless days he passes through like a shadow?"* (Ecclesiastes 6:12a) Not <u>despite</u> this world, but <u>in the middle of it</u>, we hope and number our precious days as opportunities to know Christ and make Him known in this world.




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Earth Day

Sprint Buyout Funds Chester Missions

Chester non-profit organizations benefit from the Sprint Cell Tower decommissioning. T-Mobile and Sprint merged in April, 2020 and began consolidating the number of cell tower sites. Christ's Community Church leased to T-Mobile and Sprint for more than twenty years. The Sprint lease was no longer needed. A team was formed to work through the details of decommissioning. The team included Bud Dryden, Deb Engell, Rob Eyre, Holton Falk, Woody Johnson and Chris Stephano. The outcome of the work of decommissioning was a payment of \$30,000 to the church. Some additional work was needed to make the space usable for a cost of \$5,000. The Session

voted to give the remaining \$25,000 to mission to share with organizations that help our neighbors.

Sue Parker, mission chair, researched the organizations supported through the Delaware County Foundation and identified five organizations with religious affiliations. The organization receiving \$5,000 each are the 9th Street Youth Community Center, CityTeam, Salvation Army, ChesPenn Health Services, and Child Guidance Resources.

We are grateful for all who worked to achieve the outcome that enabled the organization to continue their mission endeavors.



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Confess to God and Our Neighbors

What role does confession serve for a disciple of Jesus Christ? For one seeking true repentance, it's a spiritual discipline to clean house so to speak. It's a practice to clear the mind and not get muddled in opinions and ideas interjected by the humans of this world that draw the mind away from the foundational truth of being one who dwells with the living God, "the Creator and Formator of our being." (Fr. Adrian van Kaam)

When a confession is made, it means that I recognize and take ownership of what is off in my thinking. And over time, I may become aware of a pattern of thinking that is not in line with what is the best way to be, or think, or do something. Confession allows me to come to God who already knows me but now I am getting to know myself. When I see the same action, or reaction, over and over again, I have the chance to see it, say it, and here's the thing, I can begin to change it.

From the Book of Common Prayer, 1979, there is a confession from Morning Prayer Rite Two that encapsulates this spiritual discipline. Following the opening sentences that affirm God's holiness and divinity, there is the requisite posture for true repentance... that is the posture of "the one who has a contrite and humble spirit." Humility allows me to take responsibility for whatever minor missteps or major gaffs that knowingly or unknowingly I have been complicit in.

The Prayer of Confession opens, "Most merciful God, we confess that we have sinned against you in thought, word, and deed, by what we have done, and by what we have left undone." In one sentence, I acknowledge all the ways I fall short of the kingdom of God. (Romans 3:23) It's the next line that opened me to the what I am being called to do in alignment with God's nature.

Next is the line opens the door to exponential forgiveness not only of myself but to include everyone. I not only confess the sins I have made but I pray on behalf of the sins of the world. "Let us confess our sins against God and *our neighbor*." (Invitation to Confess (pg. 79 BCP)

What! God and *my neighbor*. Who is my neighbor? You, the family next door, the people I work with, the church family, the community, the world! Everyone is my neighbor. What benefit is this confession to one another?

When I have made a mistake and I take ownership of it, I can say to my neighbor, "You know, I think that is my fault. It's something I did not do well." Confession to one another allows for understanding what is misunderstood, making amends for what hurt another, and having a mind released from burden of the weight of sin. The weight of sin takes away from the joy that God wants for those He loves and who love Him.

Also, the prayer of Confession allows me to pray not only for my shortfalls that I take responsibility for but for also the shortfall of everyone. "For all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God," (Romans 3:23) The prayer of confession allows the believer, in humility, to pray to God directly as an intercessor for everyone. Just as Jesus prayed to the Father.

Jesus' intercessory prayer found in John 17: 7-10 reveals the divine connection from the father to the Son of God to you and me. Jesus prays, "Now they know that everything you have given me is from you; ⁸for the words that you gave to me I have given to them, and they have received them and know in truth that I came from you; and they have believed that you sent me. ⁹I am asking on their behalf; I am not asking on behalf of the world, but on behalf of those whom you gave me, because they are yours. ¹⁰All mine are yours, and yours are mine; *and I have been glorified in them*."

Jesus has been glorified in you and in me. The finality of the cross proves it. This divine connection gives you and I the power to confess and pray for each other and all the others of the world. The Prayer of Confession is a more than a spiritual discipline, it is a gift. It's a gift to unburden sin and find rest for the soul. It's a gift to invite harmony in relationships with dissonant overtones and seek peaceful resolution. It's a gift to know that my being, your being, and beings of all the world spring from the divine being of God.
